**ANNUAL GYMNASTIC EXHIBITION**

March 25 is Set as Day to Pick Nebraska Team.

The annual gymnastic exhibition has been set to occur March 25 in the Armory. The primary purpose of this event will be the selection of a team to represent Nebraska in the annual western intercollegiate gymnastic meet to be held at the Chicago university April 22.

Preparations for the Nebraska exhibition this year are much more detailed than formerly. The representative team will be chosen from the winners in the heavy gymnastic events, including horizontal bars, parallel bars, side horse, flying rings, and tumbling. Other events, such as club swinging, fencing, three classes of wrestling, will feature the exhibition. The representation from the women's department of physical education will also be a more prominent feature than heretofore. Demonstrations in both folk and artistic dancing will be given. The men's gymnastic classes will give exhibitions in first year apparatus work and advanced apparatus. One final match in both the wrestling and boxing contests will also add variety to the entertainment.
