ATHLETIC BOARD DECIDES THAT NEBRASKA IS NOT BEING TREATED RIGHT.

The athletic board transacted more than the usual amount of business at their regular monthly meeting held Monday evening in Dr. Clapp's office. The matter of granting basketball "N's" was taken up, and the following players were allowed the letter: W. C. Hutchinson, J. P. Gibson, A. H. Hiltner, O. A. Frank, S. Carrier, L. Owen and F. E. Watters.

The manager made a report on the recent basketball tournament that was highly pleasing, the event being a success. The board authorized him to pay for the banners and prizes awarded the winners. He also made a report on the negotiations for the completing of the football schedule for next fall. The game with the Kansas agricultural school was accepted.

The baseball committee reported the formal authorization of twelve intramural baseball games to be played on Saturdays. All other baseball games played this season will be without the formal sanction of the board.

Matters relating to the finding of more room for tennis and the sodding of the field were referred to the various committees. The athletic grounds were set aside for use of the women on mornings before 11 o'clock on every day except Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays.

The track team is not going to Kansas City, as was at first intended. The trip has been cancelled owing to lack of the right kind of treatment on the part of the promoters of the meet. The boys would be obliged to pay their own expenses, and this is not according to established custom.

Sunday at 4 p. m. at the association rooms in the Temple the Y. W. C. A. will hold their annual installation services. Rev. W. W. Lawrence will deliver an address and Mrs. E. B. Conant will be the soloist. All women of the university are invited to be present.
