**SPRAYING AS AN ESSENTIAL.**

Nebraska Experiment Station Issues Important Bulletin.

The Nebraska Experiment Station has just issued Bulletin 119. It contains the results of some experimental spraying tests in Nebraska apple orchards extending over a period of five seasons. Direction and conveniences for mixing the spray materials are discussed at some length as well as how to apply them. A comparison of the lime-sulfur sprays with Bordeaux mixture in russetting the fruits is given.

The spraying experiments were conducted primarily to determine what it costs to spray under Nebraska conditions, what sprayed fruit yields, and what it is worth in comparison with unsprayed fruit from the same orchard. In order to make the results applicable to the eastern third of the state, the work was done under varied conditions. Twenty-two orchards were selected, representing eighteen localities in thirteen counties. The trees varied in age from ten to twenty-eight years. Some of the orchards had been well pruned while others had been wholly neglected in this respect. In some cases the spraying was hindered by the closeness of the trees, while in others the trees were conveniently spaced. Some of the orchards had almost every convenience for mixing and applying the spray materials while others were almost completely without such conveniences. The work was done in some of the orchards with efficient power outfits with three leads of hose, while in others a hand pump was used where it was barely possible to maintain pressure for one nozzle. The cost of labor and materials was taken at the actual prices paid by the orchardists.
