TESTING SEED CORN.

Nebraska Seed Laboratory to Encourage Improvements.

The majority of wide-awake corn growers realize the advantage of testing the germination of their seed corn before planting. The "ear to row" method of improving corn has emphasized the need of selecting seed corn on the ear. Although the apparatus required for testing the germination of ear corn need not be expensive, still it is believed that there are many who hesitate to undertake this work through fear that it will involve the expenditure of too much time and labor. To satisfy this demand and to arouse a greater interest in corn improvement, the Nebraska seed laboratory has arranged to make single ear germination tests of seed corn for Nebraska farmers. Not more than fifty such tests, however, can be made for one person. If you wish you seed tested write us to that effect and we will send you fifty small envelopes in which the samples can be sent to this laboratory. The house will probably dispose of the measure this week.

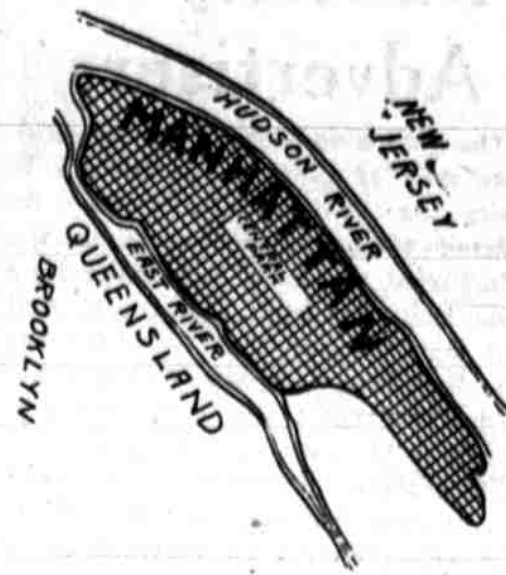
TO INCREASE MEMBERSHIP.
