tendance. The university is being
more appreciated by the people of the
state than ever before, and outside
students are coming here in increas-
ing numbers. Already the buildings
are too small and more room is need-
ed. It was hoped that this matter
would be finally settled this year so
some definite plan could be formu-
lated.

The legislators have undoubtedly
shown wisdom in their course by con-
sidering the magnitude of the project

of the state by heavy taxation. They
have left it to them to decide. That

team this year. Arthur Mays succeed-
ed in tying the world's intercollegiate
record in the fifty-yard dash. This
shows that he is going to be a good
running mate for Reed in the shorter
dashes. The other men entered
showed up well, although there were
severely handicapped. All in all it
gives us a hint that the track team is
far from being slow.

SOON TO CHOOSE A COACH.

University Man May Receive Credit

at the State high school. This school
