FACULTY TITLE CHANGES

PROMOTIONS MADE, RESIGNATIONS ACCEPTED AND OTHER BUSINESS DONE BY BOARD.

Numerous title changes have been made for faculty members. This was done at the Tuesday session of the board of regents. The following is a condensed resume of the work of the board:

The president of the board was requested by vote to write a letter to the political clubs explaining why the board deems it inexpedient to repeal the rule prohibiting political gatherings on the campus.

Resignations were received from Professor W. G. L. Taylor, head professor of political economy and commerce, to take effect Sept. 1, 1911; Dean C. R. Richards, dean of the engineering college, to take effect Sept. 1, 1911; Grace Goldena Denny, instructor in home economics.

Professor Taylor was made professor emeritus.

Resolutions were adopted expressing the regret of the board at the resignation of Dean Richards.

A petition of the military department to be permitted to charge a fee of \$1.00 per year for each cadet, was referred to the chancellor with power to act.

Consideration of a report of the senate committee on remodeling the Temple for social affairs, of the subject of farmers' institutes and of the sub-stations were postponed until the next meeting of the board.

The following ad interim appointments of the chancellor were confirmed: Emma Wilhelmson, fellow in education; William J. Duppert, instructor in forestry (detailed from U. S. government).

Resolutions of appreciation of the work of Professor Davison, and of sympathy for Mrs. Davison and relatives, were adopted.

Resolutions of sympathy for Regent Haller on the death of his mother were adopted.

New appointments were made as follows: James E. Le Rossignol, head professor of political economy and commerce; H. A. Evans, purchasing agent.
