ZOOLOGY CLUB MEETS.

At the meeting of the Zoology club April 12 in the zoology library, C. W. Mitchell reported upon two papers by Shull, a graduate student of Columbia university, detailing the results of experimental work with a certain rotifer, on the basis of which work Mr. Shull has just been appointed assistant professor of zoology in the University of Michigan. Mr. Mitchell has been doing work for his master's thesis during the past year along exactly the same line, and it is interesting to note that his work, compared to that of Shull, is more complete and more thorough. While his results differ in certain details from those of Shull, especially with reference to the question of sex determination under varying external conditions, Mr. Mitchell seems to have the much stronger evidence in support of his views. He has bred the rotifer through about eighty generations, keeping the individuals separate in small watch glasses.
