### AT LEAST THREE HUNDRED TO ATTEND THE BARBECUE

OX IS SLAUGHTERED AND STORED IN THE COOLER.

TICKETS SELL MOST READILY

Nearly Every Man in College Will be Present and Most Former Students of Lincoln.

Tickets for the law barbecue have been on sale for several days and the demand is great. It is believed by the committee that every lawyer will be present with the exception of those who are kept away by their work. The method adopted has been successful. The students were divided up into groups and tickets placed in the hands of one man for each group. Alumni and others outside of the school who intend to come may purchase tickets at the office of the registrar. Students will be unable to secure them except from some member of the committee.

The ox has already been slaughtered and put in the cooling box so that the meat will be nice and tender by next Wednesday. An expert has been secured to prepare the barbecue and a most excellent dinner is to be provided for those who attend.

Three Hundred.

Wednesday will likely be a holiday in the law college with the exception of one or two classes. Street car service has been provided and the crowd will leave for Capital Beach at 10 o'clock. The barbecue will be served about noon. A program will be given in addition to the calendar of sports already announced. Considerable enthusiasm has been manifest among both the students and the faculty members of the college. It is believed that there will be at least three hundred present. The majority of the alumni and former students in the city are going to attend and a number of let-

ters have been received from others located in distant parts of the state manifesting the same desire. The reunion will undoubtedly become an annual affair hereafter.

### AESTHETIC IN ENGINEERING.

Prof. L. A. Scipio Tells Society of its Great Importance.

Prof. L. A. Scipio addressed the engineering society on "The Aesthetic in Engineering Details." In his introduction he said it was a very much neglected subject and that there are very few text books which treat it. The subject deals with the art in designing and as styles change we can determine the stage of civilization by the beauty and types of the details of its constructions. It takes time and study to appreciate the beauty of a construction. Considerable criticism is made of engineers upon the appearance of their work. An engineer does not think so much in the designing of the appearance as he does of the strength. The principles underlying the work of the artist and the engineer are reversed. The artist produces his work regardless of scientific principles while the engineer does the opposite. He works from scientific principles and meets the technical details first and then figures on the artistic side if at all.

Professor Scipio also explained a number of rules and cited examples of construction done with regard to them. They are the symmetry, style, fitness, compared with its surroundings, form, fitness and proportion, ornamentation and the color, and harmony of the construction. The beauty of the construction has a large influence upon the public. In the case of a machine designed artistically a quicker sale will be had than if an ugly machine is produced. The same is true in buildings and everything else. It also raises the standard of the workmen. A man working amid dirty and inartistic surroundings is generally of a low standard and is dissatisfied, while a man working among artistic and beautiful surroundings is generally content and

the standard of his work is higher. A number of large manufacturing plants have taken advantage of this among which are the National Cash Register Company and the Pullman Car Works Company. In all it is easily seen that a little money spent in artistic design will improve the conditions of the owner as well as builder.

Musical comedy will take the place of an attempt at serious drama in the senior class play this spring at Minnesota. In previous years, considerable dissatisfaction has been expressed with the senior plays. They have been characterized as "undertakings beyond the ability of those who participate." The play will be "The Arraignment of Paris."
