**Schoolmasters' Club to Honor Chancellor-emeritus.**

The Nebraska Schoolmasters' club will give a banquet Friday night in honor of Chancellor-emeritus Andrews, Dr. Ernest E. Burton of the University of Chicago, will be the principal speaker, being in the first class which graduated from Denison university after Chancellor Andrews became the head of it. Chancellor Avery will speak on his work at Nebraska and Regent W. G. Whitmore, who was a boyhood friend of the great educator, will tell of his early life. An address will be made by Superintendent Crabtree.

**INFORMATION AS TO WORK.**

**Y. M. C. A. Sends Out Circular Letters to Gather Data.**

The University of Nebraska, through the Y. M. C. A. employment bureau, has sent out some 1,500 circular letters to the men of the school in regard to employment. The data desired concerns whether the student is self-supporting, or whether he is employed in any way outside of his school work, and what recompense he receives for his services. All information secured is held in confidence, the material being secured for the data it furnishes. As there is always considerable inquiry as to the extent and number of students who earn money, out of school, or who are working their way through college, the only accurate method of obtaining this information is by means of circular let-

ters and blanks to be filled out by the students themselves. In this manner accurate information on this subject is obtained, and it is the desire of those in charge of the work that every one who receives a blank fill it out properly and return it. The letters sent contain an information blank, a letter from the Chancellor, and a stamped return envelope. This is the first time this plan has been tried here, but it is employed at Columbia, Yale and other universities. Considerable hard work has

been necessary to put these letters out and more work will be required in filing and sorting the information as it comes in. The employment bureau at the Y. M. C. A., through which this mass of material passes, is an extremely busy place just at present. Over 300 circular letters have been sent to commercial clubs and employment agencies throughout the middle west in regard to the securing of summer employment for students who wish to work during their vacation. Besides these letters, advertisements are to be run in Lincoln, Kansas City, Omaha, and Sioux City papers. Every effort will be made to line up jobs for those so inclined. Students who desire summer employment should fill out application blanks which are obtainable at the association rooms in the Temple.
