COMMENCEMENT WEEK REPLETE WITH EVENTS

REV. FIFER TO DELIVER BACCA-
LAUREATE SERMON.

WILLIAM ALLEN WHITE THE ORATOR

Rev. Francis Wayland Russell Will
Speak at Alumni Day
Exercises.

This year's will be the fortieth annual commencement of the University of Nebraska. The exercises will begin with the seventeenth annual concert of the university school of music Saturday night, June 10, at 8 p. m. This concert will be given in the Temple theater. Admission will be by ticket, which can be obtained at the school of music office in the conservatory.

Sunday evening, June 11, will be the baccalaureate address. The speaker will be Rev. Orion Wesley Fifer, A. M., U. of N., '95, pastor of Grace Methodist church, Des Moines, Ia. Reverend Fifer has chosen for his subject, "Conservation of Character." Admission to this service will also be by ticket.

Alumni Day.

Tuesday, June 13, will be class day. The board of regents will meet on this day to make final recommendations for graduation.

Alumni day will be celebrated Wednesday. A varied program has been planned. From 9 a. m. to 2 p. m., banquets will be held by the various classes. At 4 p. m. the alumni address will be delivered by Rev. Francis Wayland Russell, '90, pastor of West Presbyterian church, St. Louis, Mo. Reverend Russell's subject will be, "Vision, or How Extended is Your Horizon?" From 5 to 7 p. m., the annual banquet will be served at the university farm. The day will be closed by a cotillion at the Temple in the evening.

Reception.

The Commencement exercises proper will take place Thursday morning. The procession will form on the campus at 10 a. m., and will march to St. Paul's church, where the address will be delivered by Hon. William Allen White, editor of the Emporia, Kas., Gazette, writer and man of affairs. The subject of his address will be, "The Education of Democracy."

Thursday evening Chancellor and Mrs. Avery will give a reception to the regents, faculty and students and friends in the art gallery of the library. The hours are 8 to 9:30 p. m. Alumni and friends of the university and of Chancellor and Mrs. Avery are invited.

piled lacked only eight of coming up to it, being 3,992. The total attendance includes all students in the university proper, the conservatory, the Omaha medical college, the dental college and the school of agriculture. Last year Nebraska stood twelfth among the universities of the United States in attendance, passing Yale and Syracuse from fourteenth place. The steady increase at Nebraska the past few years is unusual among schools of its kind. A year of increase is generally followed by one of proportionate decrease.
