Kansas Athletic Business Head Quits to Enter Newspaper World.

Kansas University has received the resignation of Manager W. C. Lansdon according to press dispatches received from Lawrence. He is one of the oldest athletic managers in the Missouri valley and his resignation will be noted with regret by all athletic dopsters in the valley.

It is generally understood by his friends at Kansas that he will sever his connections with the athletic association by October 1, in order to fill the position of general manager of the Central Kansas Publishing Company at Salina, Kansas.

For the past six years, Mr. Lansdon has been general manager of all athletics. When his successor takes charge of that position, he will find plans laid for university athletics through the football season which is regarded as the hardest of the sports to handle from the manager's point of view.
