FIRST TEAM WALLOPS FRESHMEN AT FARM

Walloping the Nebraska Freshmen team 40 to 0, the Cornhuskers opened the 1911 season in auspicious fashion. The freshmen, though outweighed heavily, played a spirited game, plugging right after each of the crushing line plunges of the 'Varsity.

The first ten minutes the game proceeded evenly, the 'Varsity failing to get started and it looked as if the freshman squad might pull out with at least a small defeat. However, after the game had got well started. and but a minute was left of the quarter, they started a march for the goal, shoving Fullback Purdy over for the first score.

Almost Got Away.

Warren Howard, freshman quarter, almost made a getaway for a touchdown when he got the field clear before him the ball under his arm, but Racely, the Nebraska sprinter, who was playing the 'Varsity right half. caught him from behind after an exciting 'race.

In the second quarter, the two Frank brothers. Racely and Purdy got in some good backfield work for long gains and the two big tackles performed some effective line bucking. Purdy carried the ball across for both scores.

Scrubs Got In.

Coach Stiehm played the scrubs in the third quarter, Gibson contributing two touchdowns and Ernest Frank the third. With the first team back in the fourth quarter, Purdy and Pot-

ter concluded the game with two more touchdowns.

Elliott and Hornberger did themselves proud in their work at center Saturday, Hornberger filling in at guard for a part of the game also. Big Pearson opened wide holes in the weaker freshman line for the backs to plow through and Shonka and Harmon proved well their abilities to plug the line for gains. Chauner and Lofgren played pretty defensive games, but the wetness of the ball prevented showing what they could do with the forward pass. Anderson and Swanson played sub-tackles for Harmon and Shonka for a part of the game.

Potter at Quarter.

Potter and Ernest Frank alternated at quarter, both men playing well, and getting in some long runs in addition to clever work in passing the ball. Gibson and Purdy played fullback. Gibson showing up better in Saturday's game than he has at any time this year. Owen Frank held one half all the game, Racely and Ernest Frank alternating at the other. Howard, Hawkins, Masten and Allen all played noticeably star games for the freshman team, but the pride

of that eleven is Halligan, the husky North Platter who held the fullback position. He carried the ball well and showed himself especially strong on defensive work.

Sophs Win at Drake.


