CORNHUSKERS BUILDING STRONG DEFENSIVE TEAM

Defensive scrimmage work occupied the major portion of the day's practice Tuesday, the first scrimmage held since the game Saturday. Coach Stiehm seemed to realize that his team was offensively strong and was weak in its defense and the scrubs played the ball for twenty minutes straight regardless of rules of downs, in practicing the Cornhuskers in defending their goal.

At the end of the practice the stone wall presented by the regulars was unbreakable and no gain could be made by the scrubs. The Varsity then took the ball, almost on their own goal line and in four downs pushed it over the opposite goal.

Tests Offense.

Stiehm tested the offensive work of his team thoroughly by placing every man of the scrubs on their one-yard line, making a defense three deep for the Cornhuskers to break through. Time after time the husky Nebraska backfield plowed through it for a touchdown.

All the efforts of the Cornhusker eleven are to be directed towards the scalp of Minnesota from this point on to the hour that Nebraska meets the Gophers in Minneapolis on October 21. The Kansas Aggies, who arrive here Saturday to tackle Nebraska are not being belittled, but as Nebraska is almost sure of that game the team will be saved for the big game on the Saturday following.

SEASON TICKET DISPOSAL GOES SLOWLY AT NEBRASKA

Five hundred season tickets to the athletic events of the year have been sold to students of the University of Nebraska. One out of every eight persons in the school has dug down in his jeans and bought himself a ticket—500 bought out of more than 4,000 enrolled.

Missouri sells season tickets essentially the same as Nebraska's. Half of the universities and colleges in the country sell them and practically every one of them sells comparatively twice the number that are sold at Nebraska. As an illustration Missouri has sold more than 1,100 tickets already and expects to sell close to 2,000.

The enrollment of the University of Missouri is not appreciably larger than Nebraska, is it?

Manager Earl O. Eager is the authority for the statement that admission to the Missouri and Michigan games at Nebraska Field will cost nearly as much if not more, than season tickets for students to all games and to all events will cost.

You do not want to miss either of these games and there are other events of the year that will make that season ticket look awfully good.
