VARSITY BOYS LINE UP AGAINST RATHBONE'S TEAM.

PRACTICE YESTERDAY SATISFACTORY

Stiehm is Determined to Put Out a Winning 1911 Eleven for Nebraska.

A real test of the worth of the Cornhusker brigade of this year will be made tonight on Nebraska Field, when the Varsity team meets the Freshmen and scrubs in the weekly practice game. The Varsity will have only its own players to draw on during the game, but the other two teams will alternate in lining up against the Cornhuskers.

Practice at Farm.

Rusticating out on the State Farm grounds again Wednesday night, the regulars went through a strenuous practice, under Coach Stiehm. The big mentor of the lads who make up Nebraska's hopes this year, is determined that the eleven that he turns out shall have an impenetrable line and a great part of the work of the team is in defensive playing, drilling so that when Minnesota's heavy backfield hits the Nebraska line it will be a stone wall that will check the Gophers.

ORIENTAL FARMER HERE.

Director of Turkish Experiment Station On Inspection Tour.

The experiment station was visited today by the Honorable Richard Schroeder, director of the Turkestan agricultural experiment station of Taschkent, Turkestan.

Mr. Schroeder has visited the experiment stations of New York, Michigan and Wisconsin, and goes from Nebraska to Kansas, thence to the International Dry-Farming Congress at Colorado Springs, and on the Pacific coast to study the citrus fruit industry of California.

Mr. Schroeder mentions having met Dean Bessey and Dr. Ernst A. Bessey, now of Michigan, at his experiment station in Turkestan.

RIFLE RANGE FOR CADETS

INDOOR RANGE TO BE INSTALLED ON THE CAMPUS FOR YATES' RIFLES.

Nebraska is going to win the National rifle competition this year if increased facilities can do it.

One of the finest indoor ranges in the west is soon to be installed in the basement of one of the buildings on the campus. Ten large targets with full indoor equipment are ordered, and a new rifle intended especially for indoor target work will be used exclusively.

Nebraska Enters Contest.

The entire regiment will try out in this range about December 1., and from the men making the best scores twenty will be picked to form the Yates Rifles. From this organization is selected the team to represent Nebraska in the N. R. A. contest.

The National Rifle association is composed of all the colleges in the country in which military science is taught. It furnishes all badges for sharpshooting, and for the winners of contests.

All fees required by this organization are paid by the authorities of the University.

GIRLS ALSO PLAY TENNIS.

Tournament for University Women on the Program.
