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## KANSAS FARMERS MEET NEBRASKA ON GRIDIRON

MANHATTAN WARRIORS READY  
FOR BATTLE.

### STIEHM'S TEAM IN GOOD TRIM

Game Today Not to Be a Walkaway—  
Cornhuskers Should Win—The  
Lineup.

Coach Sherwin's brave little band of gridiron men from Kansas agricultural college, arrived in Lincoln last night ready for the fray with the Cornhuskers this afternoon at Nebraska Field.

The Aggies are coming up here with a full lineup of their best players and they are going after the Missouri Valley champs to win. Their line has been the wonder and nearly the downfall of every team they have met this year, and the backfield has proven itself capable of making long gains.

#### Aggies Strengthened.

Kansas Agricultural lost its game with the Kansas State Normal last Saturday because of the weakness of their open play defense, but this week's practice has drilled them in open play and they are coming up here strong in both the close and open order game.

Nebraska is not going into today's game to run anywhere near the score that was piled up on Kearney. Coach Stiehm is not going to risk putting in several of his star players who are not just now in the finest fettle and the machine that raced through Kearney will have several subs in when it lines up against the Aggies.

#### Stiehm Drilling Nebraskans.

This week's work on Nebraska Field has been chiefly defense drill, Stiehm putting his charges through all manner of defense plays time and time again. The scrubs and the Freshman team have been playing in scrimmage against the Varsity.

The Cornhuskers are expected to plow through the Aggies for long gains according to the showings they have made against the Freshmen and the scrubs in practice. The Aggies chance to save themselves will be in their stone wall and for that Coach Stiehm has outlined several neat plays to place the oval over the goal.

DAY MORNING—ALL SEATS  
RESERVED.

Manager of Athletics E. O. Eager has announced that reserved seats for the Michigan-Nebraska game to be played in Lincoln November 25, 1911, will be put on sale at Harley's drug store, Eleventh and O streets, next Tuesday morning. The price will be two dollars to those not holding student season tickets. It is necessary to avoid complications and mistakes in assigning the seats, that they be all sold at one place, so that for the present at least, Harley will have a monopoly.

#### All Orders Cared For.

Manager Eager says, however, that he will take care of all orders from outside the city if the money is sent to him at his office in the Temple, and that he will follow the same plan in making reservations that is used at theaters—first come, first served.

For this game the entire north grandstands, both old and new, will be reserved, as will the south bleachers, except for about 500 seats which will be roped off, policed and reserved only for those men who form the rooting squad with megaphones and scarlet and cream hats.

## TALK ON DEUTSCHLAND GIVEN BY MISS HEPPNER

PROFESSOR OF GERMAN GIVES  
INTERESTING LECTURE.

### STEREOPTICAN SCENES ARE SHOWN

Describes Berlin, Nuremburg, Munich,  
Heidelberg, and Trip Down  
the Rhine.

Miss Amanda Heppner delivered an illustrated lecture on Germany, to a large audience yesterday at the Friday convocation hour.

Starting with Berlin, she led the way through its many beautiful streets and palaces. She pointed out the famous buildings, the parks, and included a splendid view of the row of royal statues in the "Tiergarten."

Berlin, she characterized as the fairest city in the world politically. Over 40,000 of its citizens administer to the public welfare without compensation.

#### Nuremburg Shown.

Nuremburg's wall was viewed, and also the old Nuremburg castle where Luther undertook his translation of the Bible. Rothenburg, where trumpets may still be heard and where oxen saunter down the streets, came next.

The picturesque city of Heidelberg was reviewed with interest. The famous "Heidelberg castle" was shown in all its majesty and grandeur.

Munich, the center of art, was characterized by a monk, whose outstretched arms held up a stein of beer. The great rose bush of Hildesheim, was shown—a rose bush over 1,000 years of age.

#### Trip Along the Rhine.

The trip along the Rhine was exquisite. With its romantic ruins, its deeply wooded shores, and its historic rocks—one of these, the "Lorelei," at sunset—it formed a trip through fairyland.

This is the second of a series of illustrated lectures given each Friday evening in Memorial hall at 5:00. Next Friday, Professor Alexis will lecture on Scandinavia.
