### Recall Old Days.

The rooters of the U. of M. remember the Cornhusker teams that have met the Gophers in the past. Still mingled with the air of determination, there is also an air of confidence; for Minnesota has faith in her team.

Realizing the importance of the coming struggle, Coach Williams and his assistants are every day putting the team through a gruelling practice. The team did not come up to the expected standard in the games with Ames and North Dakota, but some of the Varsity men who were at that time ineligible, are now in the game and the prospects look much brighter.

### Williams at Work.

Out of the material now at hand, Dr. Williams is working hard to bring out a machine which will carry all before it. Naturally the team feels the lack of McGovern, the former quarterback, whose whirlwind aggressiveness was always the dread of his opponents, but notwithstanding the loss of some of its best men through graduation, the team is the same fighting machine as it has always been.

Capron, at McGovern's old position, is one of the most aggressive players on the team. Captain Pickering, at fullback, is a tower of strength. All down the line are men of All-Western calibre.

### Need Practice.

It cannot be denied, however, that the team needs more practice before they are ready to meet the Cornhusker eleven. There is some fumbling and the playing is at times a little ragged.

## THIRTY MEN TO BE TAKEN

Athletic Board Decides to Reward Cadet Organization—Routine Business.

At the regular meeting of the athletic board of control yesterday afternoon, it was decided that the University band will be taken to Minneapolis for the Nebraska-Minnesota game next Saturday.

The railway fare of thirty men will be paid from Omaha to the Minnesota metropolis and return, hotel expenses, berth fare, and the railway tickets between Lincoln and Omaha must be taken care of individually.

### Band's Proposition.

This is virtually the proposition made by officers of the band to the board, and it is thought will meet with universal approval, although it will be necessary to reduce the size of the band one-half.

Aside from this decision the board transacted only routine business.

### MEDIC CASE DECIDED

JUDGE STEWART REFUSES INJUNCTION AGAINST NEW BUILDING.

The only remaining obstacle in the way of erecting the proposed new medical college laboratory building at Omaha was removed Saturday by District Judge Stewart's refusal to grant an injunction sought by certain Lincoln physicians to prevent the board of regents from using the legislature's appropriation of \$100,000.

With this opposition removed, it is expected that plans for the new building will be rushed, and it may be ready for occupancy within a year.

Its completion will remove all strictly medical work from the University at Lincoln, only the two years of preparatory work in the six year course being retained.
