FRESHMAN-SOPHOMORE **OLYMPICS ON SATURDAY**

BIG SCRAP OF UNDERCLASSMEN TO PRECEDE BIG MISSOURI BALL GAME.

COACH STIEHM TO REFEREE SCRAP

The Free-for-All To Be Run Off In New and Novel Manner-List of the Stunts.

Next Saturday morning the freshman and sophomore classes will contest for supremacy in the annual Olympics. It will be a grand melee to precede the Missouri football game. Coach Stiehm will referee the match.

The annual Olympics, the most looked for event of the school year, is one of the most cherished institutions of the Cornhusker. At times in the past this event has been quite dangerous, nothing in the way of weapons being barred, but shotguns and baseball bats. Compared to these stirring times the present day event is a tame affair.

Juniors to be Linemen.

Coach Ewald O. Stiehm will referee. His presence will inspire respect from the underclassmen. Members of the junior class will be on hand to assist as linesmen and possibly (but not probably) search each and every member of both classes for contraband weapons. On this list has been placed brass knuckles, cobble stones, bricks, crowbars, bats, firearms of all kinds, black jacks, dynamite, and skyrockets.

The Big Events.
