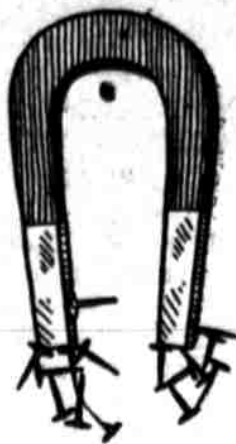
Early Compet Interest.
