LELAND PREPARES STATISTICS

THIRTEEN CHURCHES HAVE MEMBERS IN UNIVERSITY OF NEBRASKA STUDENT BODY.

Interest in religion is increasing among the students of the University of Nebraska, according to Rev. Dean R. Leland, University pastor for the Presbyterian church.

He bases his assertion on the fact that there is more church-going and Bible study, a greater percentage of church members in the student body, and fewer students who declare no preference on the card of religious information required of all new students.

Doctor Leland has compiled the following figures regarding the various religious denominations represented among the new students registered this year, with careful estimates on the percentage basis of the total number of University students adhering to each denomination.

Thus it appears that the Methodists are in the lead, with the Presbyterian and Congregationalists nearly tied for second, and that there are 638 new students registered so far in the University.

The estimates of total affiliation with the various denominations do not include the 700 students who are expected to register in the School of Agriculture next month, nor any of the students of affiliated schools.

Besides the work of the Presbyterian pastor for students at the University, there is a Bushnell guild organized among the Congregationalists, and also a Catholic Students' club. All the downtown churches, the University Y. M. C. A. and Y. W. C. A. are active in Christian work among the students. All the city churches are wide open to students.

EXPLOSION CAUSED TROUBLE.

Owen Cone Hurt by Phosphorus Explosion in Pharmacy Laboratory.

A phosphorus explosion in the pharmacy laboratory yesterday afternoon caused no small amount of excitement. Owen Cone, in whose pocket the explosion took place, had his hand badly burned. The room was filled with suffocating odors which were most offensive.
