SOUSA AND HIS BAND.

When Sousa and his band arrived in Vancouver from New Zealand on September 17, they began the last lap of their tour around the world. This tour, which is unique in the annals of military bands, began in New York last November and included various parts of America and Canada. On the day before Christmas the band sailed for England and played their first engagement in London, January 2. Sousa and his men then embarked for South Africa, and, after giving fifty concerts there, they proceeded to Australia and New Zealand. Before returning to New York, where they are due at the end of the year, Sousa's band will fill a number of engagements on the Pacific Coast and in the south and southwest. Sousa has composed a new march, which will be included in the new programs he has prepared for his return to America. 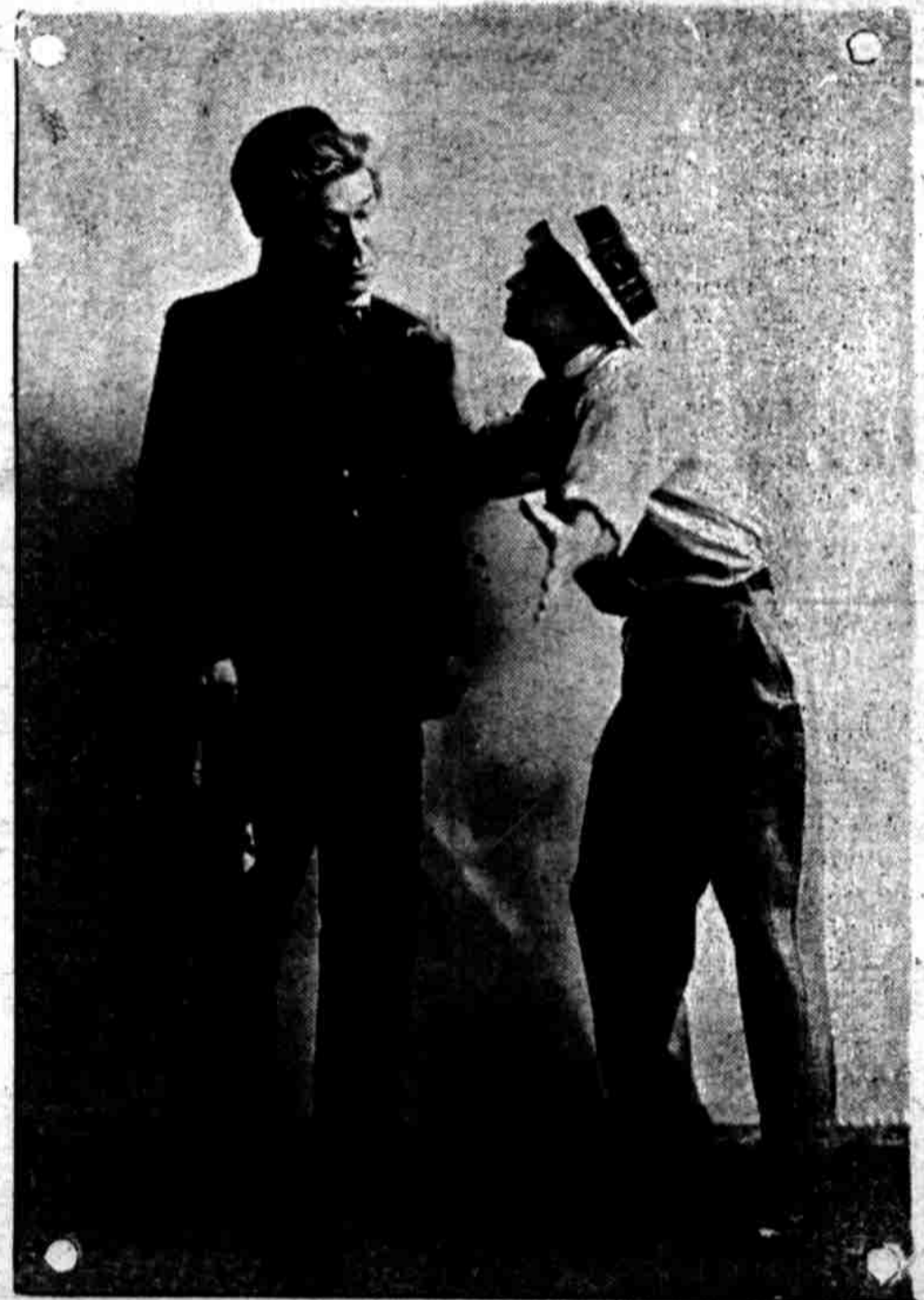
