ALUMNI HASTEN TO SUPPORT OF NEBRASKA

THIRTY CLUBS ORGANIZED IN STATE AT THIS DATE.

LIST GROWS DAY BY DAY

Secretary Kline Expects to Enroll Three Thousand Old Grads Before End of Month.

With thirty alumni clubs, having a total membership of over 600, already organized within the state this month, prospects for strong alumni spirit to boost the University are bright.

Expect Three Thousand.

George W. Kline of the class of 1900, who is executive secretary of the alumni association, expects fully 3,000 alumni to ally themselves with one of these local clubs, which are being organized in each county of the state.

From six to 200 is the range of membership in the various cities and towns, Omaha having the largest club in the state so far. Several of the larger towns in the state have no alumni club as yet, but are soon to have one.

Several Per Day.

Secretary Kline expects to be busy during the entire month and on some days will organize two or three clubs. He is being given valuable assistance by prominent alumni living in the towns where the clubs are being started.

The efforts of the organization will be directed toward developing Nebraska spirit over the entire state, and to hold if possible, for Nebraska University the students who have heretofore been taken yearly by eastern schools.

At 11:00, in Memorial hall, he will address the student body. This is an opportunity to hear one of the big men of the country. Don't miss it.

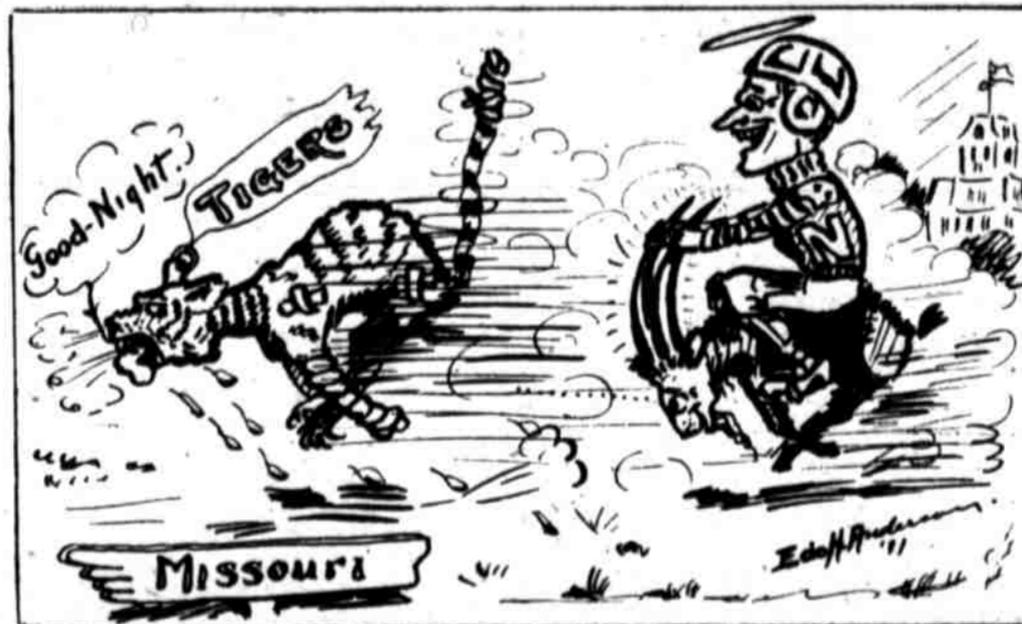
WINTER DRILL BEGINS
