VARSITY CROSS-COUNTRY TEAM LEAVES FOR KANSAS

QUINETTE OF SPRINTERS IN GOOD SHAPE FOR BIG MEET.

FIRST CONTEST IN THE VALLEY

The Race is to Be Run at the Same Time Kansas-Nebraska Game is Being Played.

Nebraska's cross-country team, composed of Anderson, captain, Swanson, Boggs, Kennedy, and Kales, leaves tonight for Lawrence to compete in the first Missouri Valley run. The course will be five miles in length, and partly over hills.

Missouri, Nebraska, Ames, Drake and Kansas are entering teams. A medal will be given to the winning school and individual prizes to the first four men. Dr. Clapp will accompany the team.

BIG RALLY AND TORCHLIGHT PARADE TO SEND CORNHUSKERS TO KANSAS

The Cornhusker football and cross-country teams leave tonight at 10:15 on the Missouri Pacific train for Kansas City.

The team, Coach Stiehm, Coach Rathbone, the cross-country men, Dr. Clapp, Fred Hunter, Manager Eager, Dr. Condra, and probably Sid Collins and other prominent men connected

with Nebraska's athletics, will be present.

Three thousand students will take part in the big torchlight parade. Torches are now on sale in the Nebraskan office and the man who stays at home will be awful lonesome. A march will be made to the Northwestern depot where the Missouri Pacific leaves, and there the real glad hand will be extended to the athletes.

FOOTBALL AND CROSS-COUNTRY MEN TO KANSAS.

LEAVE VIA MISSOURI PACIFIC RAILWAY

Both Shonka and Anderson Lead the Bunches Ready to Win for Nebraska.

Starting on the trail of the Jayhawkers, the Cornhuskers leave tonight for Lawrence, Kansas. The last game in the Nebraska list of Missouri Valley games will be played with the Kansans, Saturday at the home camp.

In company with the football squad go Captain Louis Anderson and his cross-country brothers to compete in the first annual Missouri Valley cross-country run. The run will be five miles in length, all the Missouri Valley conference schools and a number of outside schools being represented.

Pointed for Jayhawks.

Coach Stiehm's men have been drilling for two weeks in preparation for the campaign for the scalp of the Jayhawkers, and the K. U. eleven will have to show real football strength to best the Cornhuskers of this year. Nebraska is going after that championship title and after it hard.

The full squad of twenty-one men is making the trip, and the big coach will probably make various shifts in the lineup as the game proceeds. The regulars will start the contest, Hornberger being back in his old place at center and Elliott at guard.

Line is Strong.

Captain Shonka and his four big brother linemen have risen far above the many hard words passed upon their ability as a stonewall early in the season and the line today stands as the best first defense machine in the Valley and the offensive power of the big players is fully evident when one of the light backs can plunge through the wide holes made by Shonka and his teammates. The back field has improved much on its open play since the Ames game, and Kansas will find them better drilled in this department than two weeks ago.

The team will go to Lawrence by way of Kansas City.

Runners Are Fit.

Captain Louie Anderson and his fellow cross-country fiends have been keeping very silent and cutting lots of time off the first five miles made by the quintet some weeks ago. They are going down to make as strong a bid for the Missouri Valley cross-country title as the football team is for the title of the gridiron champs, and the five from Lincoln will make it hot running for the others at least.
