Add to Herbarium.

Dr. Bessey is negotiating with a German dealer for 3,000 species of South African plants, as an addition to the University herbarium.

The botany department has just received 700 specimens of plants from British Honduras. The specimens will be classified and mounted in the herbarium.

Dr. Bessey considers this a decided addition, because the plants are so entirely different from any which can be obtained in this hemisphere.

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
