

GOVERNOR ALDRICH PRESIDES OVER DEBATE

CHIEF EXECUTIVE OF NEBRASKA
TO BE MENTOR OF CONTEST.

WILL DELIVER AN ADDRESS

Judges for Local Debate Being Picked
From Minnesota—Special Reservations for Clubs.

Governor Aldrich will preside at the Nebraska-Iowa debate which is to be held at the Temple theater Friday evening, December 8. He will make an address at the opening of the debate. This announcement was made by D. M. Rogers, who is managing the local contest and will doubtless prove a good drawing card.

The judges for the debate with Iowa are being selected. By a constitutional provision of the Central Debating League, of which Nebraska is a member, these judges are selected from the state of Minnesota. For the Minnesota-Nebraska debate, which takes place at Minneapolis on December 8, the judges are invited from Wisconsin.

Rogers is making arrangements for providing groups of seats at the Nebraska-Iowa debate for the various organizations interested in forensic work in the neighboring colleges and high schools. The Ashland High School is expecting to send quite a delegation, and it is likely that the debaters of Lincoln High, of which there are a considerable number, will take this opportunity of seeing and hearing some good work.

ZOOLOGY PROFESSOR AT CONVOCATION LECTURES ON THE DISEASE CARRIERS.

Dr. F. D. Barker, of the Zoology department, gave an interesting illustrated lecture at convocation yesterday on the common animals that produce disease. The attendance was unusually large and his lecture was given in a manner that could be understood and appreciated by all.

Dr. Barker, associate professor of zoology, is one of the leaders of the science in the study of parasites. He gave a lecture of a similar nature last summer. Professor Barker will spend next semester at Harvard and will go to Europe for the summer to perform some advanced work in parasitology at London or Paris.
