

CROSS COUNTRY TEAM OFF FOR IOWA CITY

Captained by Louis Anderson, who finished first in the Missouri Valley cross-country meet last Saturday, the Nebraska cross-country team of five men left Lincoln last night for Iowa City. The Cornhusker runners are going to represent Nebraska in the annual meet of the Chicago Conference cross-country team, Saturday.

Louis Anderson, Alfred Kennedy, Boggs, Cales, and Swanson make up the five regulars, with Slater as alternate. The Cornhusker five intends to give a good account of itself and bring home some of the honors of the meet.

Nebraska was unable to take a place in the Missouri Valley meet last Saturday because of the sickness of one of the runners, but the team is in good shape and every one of the five is determined to give Nebraska a place of honor.

There will be thirteen teams entered, including Nebraska. All eight members of the Chicago Conference and five of the Missouri Valley will be there. The schools are Nebraska, Chicago, Illinois, Indiana, Iowa, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Purdue, Northwestern, Ames, Drake, Kansas, Missouri.

The meet starts at 1:15 and will be

concluded before the start of the big game in Lincoln.
