## CORNHUSKER STAR MAN COACHING GEORGETOWN

Georgetown University has an unprecedented record for this year's games. Under the leadership of Fred K. Nielson, an old Nebraska graduate, the team went to West Point and put a kink in the soldier boys by a blank score. The game was entirely in the Army territory. Georgetown has defeated Virginia two successive years, a feat that no other school has ever done.

Fred K. Nielson, the coach who made this team, played on the Nebraska team in 1901-2. He graduated from the Academic department in 1904 and took his degree in the law school two years later. At present he holds down a law position in the Department of State, between football seasons.
