# PAGEANT OF SPLENDOR BUSINESS MEN HONOR CHAMPION CORNHUSKERS

### Tender Regal Spread to Football Men in Token of City's Appreciation -- Captain Elected Today.

In a manner that leaves no room for f doubts as to the future policy of Lincoln business men with regard to support for Cornhusker athletics, the Missouri Valley football champions of the past two years were entertained at a royal banquet at the Lincoln Hotel last night by a coterie of the leading business men of the city.

At 6:45 the first squad of the Cornhuskers, together with their hosts and a trio of scribes, were ushered into the ordinary, and from then until a late hour it was a continual round of enthusiasm, reminiscence and planning for the future.

Songs and cheers interspersed the short, pithy talks of the business men, each of whom told in a different manner his idea of what Lincoln owed to the University and the football team, and what in turn the University owed to Lincoln. There was no toast list, but man after man was called upon A series of fancy drills and marches by toastmaster Louis Wettling until of the intense enthusiasm for the school and team that has been aroused by the performances of the past eleven years on the gridiron, culminating in the Michigan game.

### Big Game Here.

Coach E. O. Stiehm told of his visit to the Big Eight Conference meeting in Chicago, and assured the hosts that Lincoln would witness a game between Nebraska and either Minnesota, Michigan, Wisconsin or Chicago next fall,

Captain Shonka and Manager E. O. Eager responded on behalf of the team, and dwelt upon the records past and hopes for records to come.

Palm and others made short, spicy talks, and ex-Captain John Westover recalled Nebraska's first entry into the larger football world at the time of the Minnesota game eleven years ago.

After the banquet the business men present met to discuss plans for making such a banquet an annual affair.

## **CHANGES IN RULES** ORDERED BY CONFERENCE

VALLEY MEET INVESTIGATES RE-

BASKET SCHEDULE

The Meeting in Kansas City Proves One of Importance for Valley Athletics.

Dr. Clapp and Coach Stiehm have returned from the Missouri Valley Conference meets at Lawrence and at Kansas City and brought home the basket ball schedule with a lot of assorted information.

The Conference basket ball teams are divided into two divisions. A southern division containing Washington, Kansas and Missouri. The northerners are Nebraska, Ames, Drake. The winning schools of the divisions will then play for the championship of the Valley.

Nebraska also has two games with Kansas, a southern team. These are not championship games.

### Basketball Schedule.

The basket ball schedule has been given out and practically every date has been covered, as follows:

January 12 or 13-Drake at Lincoln. January 18-Kansas Aggles at Man-

rence (not for championship). January 26-Minnesota at Minne-

January 19 or 20-Kansas at Law-

apolis. February 9-Ames at Lincoln.

February 16-Drake at Des Moines. February 23 or 24-Ames at Ames. March 1 or 2-Kansas at Lincoln (not for championship).

Among the rules passed in regard to the basket ball season were the following: To the point of unnecessary roughness, blocking the opponent by getting in his way is to be allowed; players must be numbered to facilitate the calling of personal fouls; the home team is absolutely responsible for the conduct of players.

The officials for the games were not selected, but will be by mail soon,

Hereafter any vaulter or high jumper may have three trials to make a record, after all his opponents have withdrawn or been beaten. This gives a good vaulter or jumper a chance to make a record even if his opponents are not good enough to force him to do his best.

Very little was done regarding football and football rules. In regard to the cutting of salaries for football officials, Dr. Clapp said: "So far as I am aware, no one in the Conference had any intention of presenting to us any ruling proposing a change in this matter.."
