PROF. CALDWELL FEARS ANGLO-GERMAN TROUBLE (Continued from Page 1)

there is a little doubt in the minds of the English in regard to the outcome; a little uncertainty in regard to their superiority—a slight tone of fear; on the other hand, the Germans seem overconfident—to have a half formed opinion that the English are a decadent people, that they have passed the meridian of their power, while Germany was on the up-grade.

Dr. Caldwell compares at some length the comparative virtues of the two peoples as he sees them, and in another portion of the letter speaks of the unrest attendant upon the present sessions of parliament, and the passages of the famous lords' veto bill, which is thought to have cut off the heads of the upper house in England.

He speaks of the probability of the passage of the Irish home rule bill, which is now the subject of a great fight, and he seems to think it will eventually be passed, although he states that it is the object of much political machination on the part of the "Unionists."

Saw Suffrage Riots.

Professor Caldwell was an eye witness of the latest suffragette outburst about parliament, wherein 223 women were arrested, after they had smashed a lot of windows. Professor Caldwell doubts if such demonstrations help the cause in England, although he says it creates agitation and much talk.

Professor Caldwell is now engaged in research work along some hitherto untouched historical lines in the sources about London. He has finished his work in Germany, and after visiting in Italy, Switzerland, and France, and examining certain documents there, he will return to Lincoln, arriving about August 15, 1912.
