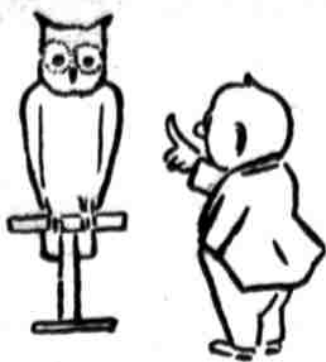
Iron Sphinx Formal.
