INTERFRAT BASKET-BALL SCHEDULE ANNOUNCED

PROGRAM OF GAMES MADE UP FOR THE GREEKS.

THE BOARD FORMS NEW RULES

Begin Playing January 22—Practice Hours Made for Each Organization.

The inter-fraternity athletic board met late Tuesday afternoon and arranged the basketball practice hours and made the ruling that only those men who are on the varsity basketball team this year are to be barred from participation in the games.

The games are to be held with the week beginning January 22, and all games are to be played off in the divisions as soon as possible. The big deciding tournament will be held on February 10.

A committee consisting of Brannon, McKee and Christmas was appointed to select a board of officials to referee the games.

LOWRY SPEAKS ON ART

CRITIC TO DISCUSS EXHIBIT AT CONVOCATION THIS MORNING.

Dr. H. B. Lowry will give an art criticism at Convocation today. This is on account of the art exhibit which is being given in Art Hall, and many of the finest pictures of the exhibit will be shown this morning.

Dr. Lowry is a fervent lover of art. He is a connoisseur of some note in Lincoln and for many years has explained and interpreted the pictures of the exhibit to those who, fond of art, are not so well informed upon its beauties and significance as himself.

BOARD TO ELECT NEW STAFF

SEVEN DAILY NEBRASKAN JOBS TO BE DISTRIBUTED SOON BY STUDENT BOARD.

The publication board has issued a call for applications for positions on the editorial and business staffs of the Daily Nebraskan for the second semester. Four men are to be selected for positions on the editorial force and three for work in the business department. No applications for any of the various positions have as yet been filed with the secretary of the student publication board.

An important change in the methods of election of the business staff will be begun with this semester. Heretofore the assistants have been appointed by the business manager, but this time the board will elect all members of the financial department force. This is not a new idea. On the other hand, the board members have for some time been considering the change in policy and have decided now to make the change. According to the notice issued by the board, applications for "editor-in-chief, managing editor, two associates, business manager, assistant business manager and circulator" will be received at the office of the secretary of the board until noon, Friday, February 19, 1912.

EIGHTEENTH ART EXHIBIT SESSION AT LIBRARY HALL

NINETY-FIVE PICTURES ON SHOW FOR STUDENTS AND OTHERS.

CLOSING DATE JANUARY 28TH

Famous Paintings Shown in National Galleries Among Those Exhibited.

The eighteenth annual art exhibit is now being held in Library Hall. In size and artistic value it exceeds all former ones, and is worthy of the patronage of all who have an opportunity of visiting it.

Among the ninety-five pictures on exhibit are many of great value. "Reflection," by Sergeant Kendall, the picture of a child, is valued at \$5,000; "The Pink High Chair," by A. Worthington Ball, has been exhibited in the Paris Salon, the Pennsylvania Academy, and the Chicago Art Institute; two figure paintings by Frank Benson are wonderful because of the natural appearance and beauty of the white raiment, an effect very difficult to produce. "The Blue Cup," by Joseph De Camp, is a wonderful portrayal of light and shade.

On Monday and Tuesday evenings Dr. Lowry gave short addresses on the character and merits of the pictures exhibited; similar talks will be given by Miss Hayden and Professor Fling before the close of the exhibit.

The exhibit will close on January 28, and in the two weeks that remain every student should avail himself of the opportunity of seeing a collection of art such as has rarely, if ever, been equalled in Nebraska.

NO OPEN HOUSE SUNDAY

FACULTY OPPOSES ENTERTAINMENT PLANS OF LOCAL FRATERNITY.

The "open house" planned to be given by a fraternity for next Sunday afternoon has been indefinitely postponed by that fraternity, owing to the attitude taken by a number of the faculty on the subject.
