An abundance of new and old material has been showing up for practice, although only indoor work is allowable as yet. The greatest loss to the track this year is last year's captain, Guy Reed, who is at present devoting himself to the task of coaching the men. He was a quarter-miler and two-twenty man, holding records in each event.

Among the old men back are Becker, the half-miler, who ran Hill of Minnesota such a close race, the time being less than two minutes; Art May, who tied the intercollegiate record for the fifty-yard dash, and Anderson, this year's captain, the crack long distance man of the Valley. It is expected that Linstrum and Christmas will don gym suits in the near future.

There are a number of former high school stars among the new men. Reavis, the holder of the state record for the pole vault, is eligible for this year's team, as are Brannon, a crack quarter-miler from Lincoln and holder of the Nebraska indoor twenty-fiveyard record; Kennedy, from Omaha, holder of the state mile record. Racely, the speedy football man and ex-Bellevue sprinter, has recovered from his football injury sufficiently to be out for some light work. Roberts seems to be showing up well in Nebraska's weak department, the low hurdles.
