## CLASS ATHLETES TO HOLD CONTEST

Tryouts for Various Teams Will Be Held at Three O'clock This Afternoon.

Charter Day will be celebrated Thursday with the annual holiday commemorating the founding of the University in 1869. All classes will be excused and a program has been arranged for that will make the day one of memories for some time.

The mid-winter graduating exercises will be held in the Temple, Thursday evening. A class of about thirty will receive diplomas, divided as follows between the different colleges: Ten students from the college of arts and Sciences, three from the college of law, three from the agricultural college, two from the teachers' college, and six from the graduate college.

### Class May Be Changed.

This class is subject to change, however, for the names of the candidates for degrees will be presented before the several faculties Wednesday afternoon and will be decided upon then.

Dean W. G. Hastings of the college of law will deliver the commencement address, speaking on the quotation:

"Learning without thought is wasted; thought without learning is dangerous."

The Board of Regents will meet at 11:00 o'clock, Thursday, and at 2:00 o'clock the departments of the University will be open to the public.

In the afternoon, beginning at 1:45 o'clock, will be held a competitive drill by the Pershing Rifles, a concert by the University band, and the annual indoor inter-class meet. Admission to the three events will be by 25-cent ticket.

### Meet May Be Sensation.

The inter-class meet, open to all the school, bids fair to be a record breaker. A large number of men have been working out on the campus for the meet and a big representation is expected in from the Farm to add to the excitement.

The order of events will include a 25-yard run, rope climb, fence vault, high jump, high kick, pole vault, inter-class relay, and inter-class tug-of-war. Gold, silver and bronze medals will be given the men winning first, second and third places.

The winner of the meet, the class that gains the most points, will be given a banner. Banners will also be given to the class winning the relay and the tug-of-war.

Tryouts will be held at 3:00 o'clock Wednesday afternoon. All men wishing to try out should hand their names to their class managers, as follows: Seniors, Louis Anderson; juniors, Art May; sophomores, Cut Brannon, and freshmen, Ed Pettis.

## LOYAL STUDENTS GATHER TO AID OF DAILY NEBRASKAN

The subscription campaign for the Daily Nebraskan was begun in earnest this morning, when numbers of tag venders made their appearance on the campus. A number of representative students of the University spoke in the various classes this morning on the urgency of subscribing to the "Rag" and thus manifesting the characteristic Nebraska spirit.

The Black Masque girls took charge of a table in the library and industriously besought all persons entering that building to buy a tag and thus earn for themselves an emblem of school patriotism.

Speakers in the class rooms dwelt upon the necessity of meeting the deficit which the Nebraskan is now fac-

ing. They also referred to the commendable action of Kansas University students in rallying to the support of the excellent K. U. daily. It was pointed out that with added subscriptions merchants would be more willing to advertise and would pay better rates for space in the Daily Nebraskan. A larger paper would likely result from increased patronage and thus the students would get a larger return for the money invested in subscriptions.

Through the agency of Chancellor Avery it was arranged that each professor would allow the student speaker ten minutes of the time allotted to class work. None of the speakers exceeded this time in the early morning classes.

## "CORNHUSKER" TO BE COSTLY

CONTRACT FOR PRINTING 1,000 COPIES IS LET FOR \$2,000.

The printing contract for this year's Cornhusker has been let by Manager Harry Coffee to Jacob North & Co. The cost of printing alone, as called for by this contract, is \$2,000 for 1,000 copies. This price does not include the cost of securing art work, cartoons, engravings and incidentals, which will in themselves amount to over \$2,000. This brings the total cost of the work up to some \$4,000, or \$4.00 per single book. Thus, when the student buys the book in the spring, he will pay only \$2.00 for his annual, receiving gratis the other \$2.00 value of the book, which has been secured for him by the energy of the publication's business staff and the liberality of its advertisers. This year's book will be superior to that of 1911 in that, among other things, it will contain forty-eight more pages.

### PLAY PROMISES WELL.

The prices for the play will be \$1.00, 75 cents, 50 cents and 25 cents, and the tickets will go on sale at the Oliver next Monday morning.
