 The College of Arts and Sciences

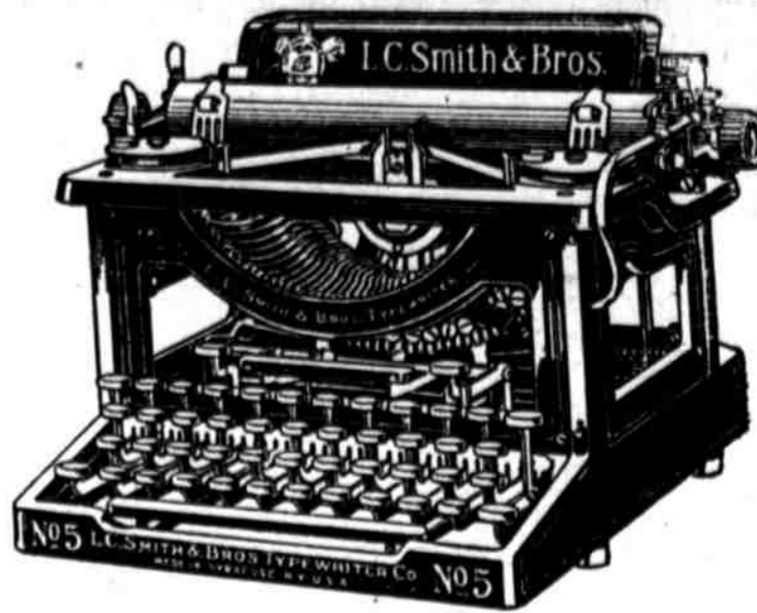
The Komensky is Out.
