SUFFRAGE WON'T HELP.

But Women Will Get It Anyway, Says Professor Fossler.

"I have no doubt but that woman suffrage will come, but I fail to see

where it will in any way improve upon the conditions now existing," said Prof. Lawrence Fossler of the University yesterday morning. "Our present system of the franchise is, to say the least, illogical. Reform of some kind is undoubtedly needed but giving the woman the ballot, as far as I am able to see, will in no way assist in the reform. In fact, I believe that when woman suffrage does come, as it eventually must, there will be no material change in the results."
