

CORNHUSKERS LOSE OLD ENEMIES ON THE TRACK

Two Woodbury Brothers and Ammons Decline to Turn Out at Kansas.

Nebraska lost her worst enemies on the track Wednesday when the Woodburys and Ammons refused to turn out at Kansas. For the last few years this trio has won a large percentage of the points put to the credit of the Red and Blue and the Jayhawkers now have a sad loss to make up.

In every track contest that Ammons entered last season he made points for Kansas. In the meet with Nebraska he scored eight points, first in the shot and second in the discus. In the Missouri Valley Conference meet he repeated the performance.

"Buzz" Woodbury has not failed to place in any meet he has entered since he went to Kansas. He ran hurdles and relays, always bringing Kansas points. The broad jump also was one of his specialties.

Ted Woodbury is known all over the country for being a fine athlete. He took thirteen points in the Nebraska-Kansas meet of 1911, and more than ten in every other one he entered. In his freshman year he broke the pole vault record for the Missouri Valley.

Ammons is ruled out this year because he is planning to play baseball and the Missouri Valley rules will not allow the football star to enter more than two sports the same year.

The Woodbury boys are prevented from entering track work this season by parental objections.

BASEBALL TEAM IN DOUBT

PROPOSAL MADE TO BEGIN INDOOR PRACTICE, BUT RULES REMAIN UNCHANGED.

Baseball at Nebraska is a doubtful factor just at present, as no action has been taken by the Missouri Valley Conference toward changing the present stiff rule as to eligibility. Under that now in force very few really good players would be allowed to play, as almost all have at some time or other in the dim past taken some prize, such as a box of cigars or a suit of clothes for hitting a certain part of the fence. Last year a team was made up under this rule, but did not show up to a very great advantage. A revision of this rule is now under consideration by the conference. If changed as proposed, only those playing league ball and subject to draft are disbarred. Kansas is now training a team to compete if this change is made, almost all of whom are ineligible under the present ruling.

Material for a good baseball team is thick here at Nebraska. A number of men have achieved statewide fame by their playing in the small minor leagues hereabouts. Expert pitchers as well as catchers and batters with a 400 average are attending classes with their ability all unknown. If this new ruling goes into effect Nebraska can put out a team which would likely be champion of the Valley. Practice will have to begin in the near future, however, to accomplish anything, as Missouri, Ames and Kansas already have their squads at work indoors.

It has been proposed to begin indoor practice here next week and a number of players have been notified to get in readiness.
