UNIVERSITY SECURES VALUABLE EQUIPMENT

NEW APPARATUS INCREASES
WORKING EFFICIENCY IN
MANY DEPARTMENTS.

Equipment valued at thousands of dollars and of almost inestimable worth in increasing working efficiency has been acquired by the various departments of the University within the last two semesters.

One of the most valuable additions to departmental apparatus or material to be made recently is the \$1,500 collection of wax models in the department of physiology of the college of medicine.

Mounting Skeletal Collections.

In the department of geology two powerful microscopes have just been added to the equipment at great expense, and a valuable collection of hand specimens of rock has also been secured. The mounting of new skeletal collections is being done and this work when completed will give Nebraska one of the country's prominent collections of that nature.

A remarkable projecting lantern is one of the newest acquisitions in the department of botany. A collection of about 1,200 Philippine plants for the herbarium, over 400 samples of woods from the same islands, a large collection of ferns from Jamaica, and bamboos from the Philippines, Porto Rico and Panama are other additions to the botany equipment within the last month or two.

A new giant telescope is now being built for the University observatory and new books are constantly being added to the already immense general and law libraries.

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
