**AN OPINION.**

The following is an anonymous opinion received by the editor touching on the newly instituted manner of choosing the Ivy Day orator:

"A recent issue of the 'Rag' contained an announcement of the Ivy Day tryouts, which ran as follows: 'Before this year the orator has been selected by the senior class in the same manner as in any class affair; this year, however, the aspirant must show what he can do before the position is awarded him.'

"Is this one tryout a sufficient test? One of the contestants has won the position of alternate on the intercollegiate debating team for the past two years; another won a place on the debating squad two years ago, and was a member of the winning team in the interclass debate four years ago. Another student who was an applicant for the position before the tryout was decided upon was a member of the intercollegiate team that met Iowa this year.

"All these positions were won by tryouts. Does this not show what these candidates 'can do'? It surely proves them competent. Then wouldn't it be more in accordance with the spirit of the day to have the class make the selection from these men, who have surely shown themselves competent, and more so since the class is the best judge of the personality and competence of the candidates?"

**STUDENTS GOING TO ISLANDS**

**QUINTET SECURE POSITIONS IN SCHOOL AND MILITARY SERVICE IN PHILIPPINES.**

Five Nebraska students have accepted government positions in the Philippines and will sail from San Francisco April 24.

Three of the five are girls and are under contract to stay for two years. They are Miss Anna East, Edith Forrest and Bessie Roberts. Miss East, class of 1912, will teach domestic science in Manila. Miss Forrest, 1910, a Chi Omega, will also teach domestic science. Miss Roberts expects a high school position.

Allen Newman, 1912, will become a lieutenant in the constabulary. Mr. Swanson will also have an army position. He graduated in 1908.

The trip will be made by way of Honolulu and Japan. Stops will be made at both places. Some of the party are already planning to return by way of Europe at the end of two years.
