CORNHUSKER CAMPAIGN HAS SUCCESSFUL DAY

ABOUT FIVE HUNDRED COPIES SOLD THURSDAY.

EXPECTED TO REACH 1,500 TODAY

Many Students Volunteer to Take Orders for Annual—Professors First to Seek Receipts.

Yesterday was a busy day for the Cornhusker people as the rush for orders was even greater than expected. Professor Hinman was the first to hasten across the campus the moment the campaign was on, and obtained a receipt for one of the annuals. Dr. Condra and Dean O. V. P. Stout proved close seconds.

A large number of students expressed their willingness to aid in the taking of orders, but owing to the fact that only a few were needed, the first on the spot in the morning were chosen. Among this number were Gus Lofgren, "Biddy" Mead and "Stub" Hascall, who headed the list in the number of orders taken.

A Busy Spot.

At the entrance of the chapel, where the all-University convocation was held, there were two tables with a large sign on each to the effect that "orders for the Cornhusker are taken here," and from a general observation, it could easily have been seen that the youths in charge had about as much as they could attend to in making out the receipts for the students.

At the end of the day's campaign, a count was made of the number of Cornhuskers sold, and it was found that the number was about five hundred. "Tomorrow," in the words of Business Manager Coffee, "we'll make the number 1,500 or bust."

Copy All In Soon.

Since the call for all the copy to be in by Friday was made, much of the best material that will appear in the book was turned in during the time the order takers were busy on the campus. Some of the editors still have a few write-ups and jokes yet to be handed in, but special terms were made with these authors, as their work requires a few days longer in order that something might happen which would be worth comment in the book. This being the case, any other good write-ups, or jokes especially, will be accepted a few days late.

More than ever before the annual of this year will portray the true Nebraska spirit, and for that reason if no other, it will be a book that every student in the University ought to have. The freshman 220-yard dash, which has no connection with the meet, but was more of an experiment, was won by Reese, with Zumwinkel and Coffee second and third.
