

NO TENNIS THIS SPRING

NEW GROUNDS CANNOT BE EQUIPPED IN TIME FOR USE NOW.

Although it will be impossible for the University to provide tennis courts this spring, arrangements have been made to furnish the athletic management with three first-class courts for use in time for next fall's workouts.

The Regents at their April meeting, authorized Superintendent Chowans to start work on the grounds immediately east of the athletic field. This property is at present occupied by three dwellings and the tenants will have to be ejected before any work can be begun.

No special appropriation was made for this work, the understanding being that the authorities should be free to construct and equip three first-class courts. The cost will probably reach \$300, and this will include all necessary nets, backstops and ground tools.

It is expected that with the creation of some lawn tennis grounds reserved especially for the use of the University, interest in this popular game will increase. The Missouri Valley Conference has in its schedule an annual tennis meet, and Nebraska is considerably handicapped in this event in not having suitable equipment with which to develop a team.

There are quite a number of tennis "sharks" roaming around the campus who spend their summers wielding the racquet, and it is expected that when Stiehm gets hold of a few of them Nebraska will be in line to take a leading place in his line of sport.

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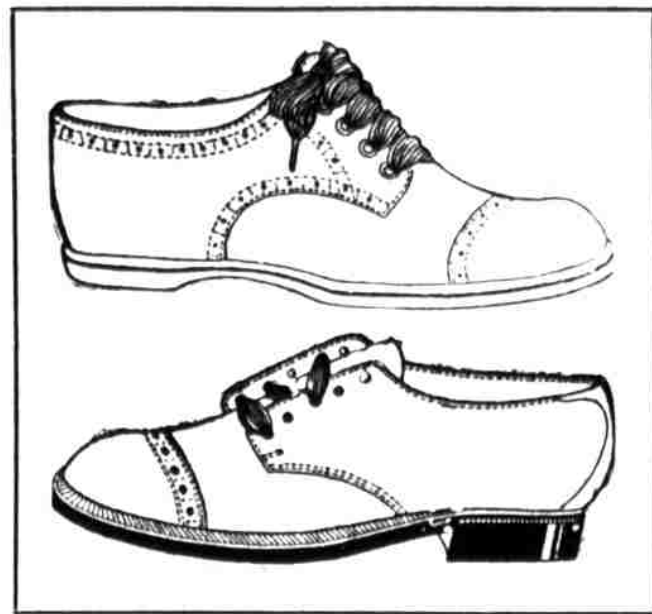
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Chancellor Avery went to Omaha yesterday to attend a meeting of the property committee, which was given power by the Regents to act on the bids for the new medical building at Omaha.



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
