Iowa Aggies Have Had But Little Time for Training.

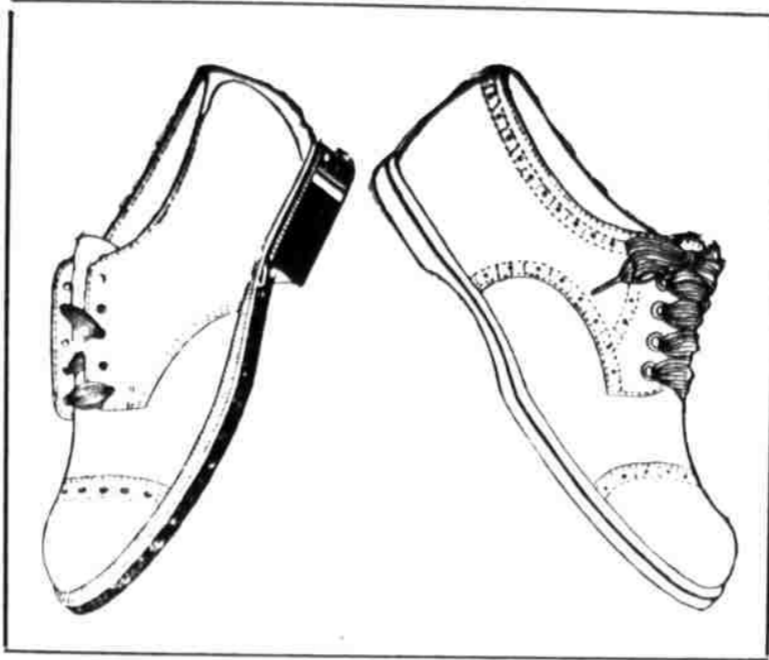
