

NEW REGULATIONS TO GOVERN GIRLS' CLUB

PERMANENT FUND WILL BE CREATED TO CARE FOR SICK STUDENTS.

At a recent meeting of the Girls' Club the constitution was revised, several important changes being made.

Every girl now becomes, by registration in the University, an associate member and upon payment of the yearly dues of thirty-five cents, an active member. Of the dues, twenty-five cents goes toward the permanent fund for the care of the sick students or the assistance of those who are working their way through school. The remainder of the dues is applied towards the yearly expenses of the club.

The executive board, composed of the four officers and three members each from the senior, junior and sophomore classes, has general direction of the affairs of the club.

The council is a new provision and is arranged for as follows:

Article VII. THE COUNCIL.

Sec. I. The council shall be composed of representatives from each literary society and sorority and from each rooming house at which four or more University women live; the president of the Y. W. C. A. and women's class societies and the members of the executive board.

Sec. II. Representatives to be elect-

ed shall be chosen the first week of each school year by the groups which they are to represent and shall preferably have been in attendance at the University one year.

Sec. III. The office of the council shall be to aid in furthering the usefulness of the club by helping to determine its activities and by bringing a fuller knowledge of these activities to the women of the school.

The following method of election was determined upon:

Article IX. METHOD OF ELECTION.

Sec. I. Officers and members of board shall be elected to serve for one year. Election shall occur on the first Thursday in May and be by the Australian ballot system.

Sec. II. President and vice president shall be elected from the junior class, and preferably shall have served on the board. The secretary shall be elected from the sophomore and the treasurer from the freshman classes.

Sec. III. Nomination of officers and members of executive board shall occur at a mass meeting to be held one week before election.

Sec. IV. Executive board as nominating committee for the club will present the names of six juniors, five sophomores and five freshmen. Two additional members of each class may be nominated at the mass meeting.

Sec. V. The junior receiving the highest number of votes becomes the president, and the junior receiving the next highest number becomes the vice-president of the organization. The sophomore and freshman receiving the highest number of votes become secretary and treasurer respectively. The

three in each class receiving the next highest number of votes become members of the executive board. In case of a tie names shall be taken in alphabetical order.

Sec. VI. Members of the club who have paid their dues on or before election day are eligible to vote.

Sec. VII. Upon an officer of the club becoming ineligible, her successor shall be the member from her class on the board who received the next highest number of votes at the election.

Sec. VIII. Upon a class representative of the executive board becoming ineligible her successor shall be selected from the same class by the executive board.

Election by the Australian ballot system will occur May 24, from 10 to 12 and 2 to 4 in University Hall. Any girl is eligible to vote who has paid or pays twenty-five cents dues for the present school year.

Inspection May 10.
