

SOPHOMORE PLEDGING ADJUSTED BY SORORITIES

Complete rules to govern the rushing and pledging by the sororities during the school year of 1912-13 have been given out by the intersorority council. These regulations have been formulated after the consideration of the question both by the council and by the various sororities themselves, during the entire year. They are not expected to remove all the undesirable points of the present rules, but are thought to be a decided improvement over the present requirements.

I. Pledging

1. Twenty-eight entrance credits.
2. Twelve hours earned in the U. of N.
3. No delinquency.
4. Registered for twelve hours of collegiate work.
5. Date of pledging as soon as semester reports are available.
6. A sister may be pledged to the sorority to which her sister belongs the fifth week of classes.

II. Initiation

1. Registered for twelve hours' collegiate work at the time of initiation.
2. No delinquency.
3. Initiations may take place any time after pledging.

III. Rushing

1. There shall be no rushing before the third week of classes.

2. There shall be no rushing in public places.
3. Calls, of not more than one hour, may be made from five to six on school days and from Friday evening to Saturday evening.

4. Entertainments shall be in the sorority houses, with the exception of two general entertainments which may be given in private homes.

- a. No organization shall give more than eight weekends to entertainments, nor more than two entertainments in one week.

- b. All entertainments must be simple and shall not last longer than three hours.

- c. No rushee shall be entertained more than once each week.

- e. No engagements are to be made before Monday of the week of the entertainments.

- e. All entertainments shall be registered weekly with the chairman.

5. No matriculants shall stay all night with any sorority girl, active or alumna.

6. There shall be no rushing of girls who are attending Lincoln preparatory schools, and who are not registered for twelve hours in the University.

7. There shall be no rushing with men.

IV. Violation

1. Any violation of these rules shall be reported to the chair-

man and brought before the council for discussion. Such complaints must be written and signed by the complaining sorority.

2. Penalties for violations of the rules are to be decided by the Council.
