#### CANDIDATES BEGIN TO FILE

ASPIRANTS FOR PLACES ON THE ATHLETIC BOARD BEGIN TO FLOCK.

Applications have already commenced to come into Dr. Clapp's office for the position of student member of the athletic board. A number of prominent men in school have also unofficial announced their intention of entering the lists, so the prospects look good for a seven-foot ballot at the election a week from this coming Monday, May 20.

The method of getting your name on the ballot for selection by the student body for one of these jobs is simple. All that is required is a statement from the registrar that the applicant has completed twelve hours of work in the University of Nebraska and is now in good standing in at least twelve registered hours. In addition to this, a personal statement must be made to the effect that he will attend the University at least one more semester, and can take care of the duties imposed by membership on the board.

Upperclassmen on Board.

The board is almost invariably composed of juniors and seniors, so the best chance for election seems to be given the candidates who are sophomores or juniors at the time of the election. The viewpoint of the student body seems to be that older classmen have had more opportunity to study the needs of University ath letics and so are better fitted for membership on the board. Lower class men have in several instances in the past been elected, however, and are entirely eligible under the rules.

All formal applications must be in Dr. Clapp's hands by Monday, May 13, at twelve o'clock. No names will ap pear on the ballot which are filed later than this time. Names of candidates will be in alphabetical order on the ballot and the election will be held under the Australian system. No college or class distinction what ever will distinguish any man's name.

The election will be conducted by the faculty members of the board a week from the date of closing the filing of applications, Monday, May 20. Polls will be in Memorial hall and will be open from 9:30 to 12:30 and 1:30 to 4:30. The question of eligibility of voters will be decided by a com plete list of male students in the Uni versity who satisfactorily completed twelve hours work last semester. Any oversight or mistakes on this list can be corrected by special certificates from the registrar. About eight hundred and fifty men are eligible to vote in this election, so the work of giving out and counting the ballots may become quite a task
