

## INSPECTION TOMORROW

GOVERNMENT OFFICIAL TO REPORT ON UNIVERSITY MILITARY DEPARTMENT.

The annual inspection of the military department by the captain general of the general staff appointed for this purpose, will take place tomorrow afternoon, or possibly Saturday morning. He will arrive in Lincoln Friday morning at ten o'clock and will probably remain until Saturday evening or later.

Plans for the inspection as originally made were for May 14, but this date was changed to accommodate itself to the itinerary of the inspector's trip, which takes in many schools of the west. He comes to Nebraska direct from Ames, where he holds the annual government review today.

The possible change from Friday afternoon to Saturday morning is caused by Professor Engberg of the delinquency committee raising an objection to dismissing classes Friday. All members of the regiment will miss classes the whole of next week on account of camp and some serious difficulty in passing in their work might be encountered if more "skips" were allowed.

Preparations are going forward rapidly for camp next week. The quartermaster's department is rushed badly in taking care of those paying camp dues and receiving equipment for camp. Entertainment has been arranged for each evening of the stay at Crete and an all round interesting time is promised.
