CADETS OFF FOR CAMP AVERY

TAKE BURLINGTON FOR CRETE AT HIGH NOON.

DAILY PROGRAM IS ANNOUNCED

Orders of Every Description Crowd the Day's Program—Permits Necessary to Leave Camp.

The soldier boys leave for Crete today at noon. Assembly will be blown at 12:00 and the regiment will take a special train on the Burlington a few minutes later. Blankets and other possessions to be taken to camp must be packed in a roll and suspended over the shoulder. Cooking utensils, etc., will be carried in the haversack.

Each cadet is cautioned to take a copy of the Yates drill regulations with him, as it contains the general orders which each cadet must know.

The weather looks bad for a comfortable encampment, as the wind will make it rather chilly sleeping on the "cold, cold ground."

SENIORS MAKE THEIR ANNUAL EXODUS TO MILFORD TOMORROW

Special Burlington Train Leaves Lincoln at 7:30, Returning in the Evening—Seniors Excused From Classes.

Tomorrow morning the seniors will be turned loose upon the town of Milford to enjoy themselves as best they can in pursuit of the pleasures that picnickers usually enjoy.

At 7:30 o'clock a special Burlington train will leave Lincoln packed with such seniors as are able to muster the price of a ticket, which amounts to 35 cents, together with additional costs in the form of railroad fare. After reaching Milford the class will be ushered to the picnic grounds, which are so situated as to give opportunity for boat riding as well as the games and races which will constitute the pleasures for the afternoon.

All seniors will be excused from their classes in view of the occasion. There is no necessity to carry anything along except jubilant spirits as meals will be served on the grounds. Tickets will be for sale on the campus all during today.

ANNUAL INSPECTION IN ARMORY

Unfavorable Weather Conditions Necessitated the Doing Away With the Regimental Review.

The annual inspection of the University cadets took place Saturday morning under unfavorable weather conditions which necessitated the holding of the same in the armory. Each company was put through a thorough examination during which the cadets were quizzed as to their knowledge of military tactics. After this was completed the bayonet exercise by Co. "E" Butt's manual by Co. "E" closed and extended order by Co. "D" were executed for the inspecting officer, Captain H. H. Tebbetts, U. S. A.

In a few remarks to the officers, Captain Tebbetts explained the purpose of military drill in the state universities declaring by way of illustration that if the country were today to be involved in war, the present army would be inadequate to cope with the situation and would be forced to rely upon the young college men for recruits. He further urged the cadets to cooperate with the commandant in carrying out his present reforms.

Captain Tebbetts left Sunday for the State Agricultural School of South Dakota.

Further Change Made in Arrangements to Avoid Conflict With Other Events on the Twenty-fifth.

A date has finally been decided on for the Pan-Hellenic formal. After considerable postponing, May 29 has been selected for the Greek dance. ENTRIES IN FOR FETE DAY

OVER 200 MEN FROM FIFTEEN SCHOOLS REPRESENTED.

A FEW TEAMS TO ARRIVE FRIDAY

Every Effort Being Made to Entertain Visiting Athletes—Fraternities to Get in Their Good Work.

Everything is beginning to look very rosy for the high school Fete Day which will come off next Saturday afternoon on Nebraska Field. All arrangements have been made for the receiving of the young hopefuls and to show them a good time while in Lincoln.

All the fraternities are getting busy planning social events in honor of the visitors, intending, of course, to pave the way for next year's rushing season.

It is the general impression that some of the teams will arrive in Lincoln Friday afternoon, but the greater majority will come the following morning, as some have to come from a greater distance than others.

The following high schools will be entered in the meet: Ashland, Auburn, Beatrice, Beaver Crossing, Clay Center, Falls City, Hastings, Kearney Military Academy, Lincoln, Nebraska City, Nebraska Military Academy, Omaha, Pawnee, Pierce and York.

The program of events is not yet out, but the events will be the same as they were last year, as follows: 100 yard dash, 220 yard dash, 880 yard run, one mile run, 120 yard hurdle, 220 yard hurdle, running broad jump, running high jump, 12 pound shot put, 12 pound hammer throw, the discus throw, and the one-half mile relay.

These events will start at 2:00 o'clock with 200 entries, counting all the high schools that will enter men.

CORNHUSKER SUBSCRIPTIONS

Business Manager Coffee Unable to Fill Further Orders On Account of an Exhaust in the Supply.

All Cornhuskers gone—This was the announcement made by H. B. Coffee, business manager of the book, yesterday. This means that all those who have not ordered a book will be deprived of the same, Mr. Coffee says, however, that he will put on sale all copies that are not called for by subscribers inside of four days following publication. These will then sell at \$2.25, as will also those that were subscribed for after the two days set aside for subscription.

This year's supply will not meet the demand, the reason for this being that only 800 orders were filled on the days set aside for that purpose. As a consequence only 1,250 copies were ordered printed, the management not feeling warranted in giving the printer any larger order on the strength of only 800 copies sold.
