They should constantly remember that they wear a uniform which marks them as University men, and that their bearing and general conduct can and will reflect either honor or discredit upon the University.

They should further remember that they are to encamp in a college town. They will to some extent be under the eyes of students and professors whose ideals of student conduct are high.

I trust that during the coming encampment nothing will be said or done that will be unworthy of gentlemen who represent the University of Nebraska.

**CORNHUSKERS BEAT GOPHERS**

**DUAL MEET WON BY CLOSE SCORE OF 64-53.**

**MILE RELAY PROVES A FEATURE**

**Despite Threatening Weather Good Crowd Turns Out—Valley Records Are Beaten.**

Saturday Nebraska defeated Minnesota in their annual dual meet. The meet was very close up until the last two events. The mile relay was the deciding event of the meet, as well as the most exciting. The final score stood 64 to 53. Nebraska showed up very weak in the weights with the exception of the hammer throw, which was won by Harmon. There was also a gap in the broad jump while the high jump and 120-yard hurdles were easy for Nebraska.

There was a mistake made in the statement of the local papers in saying that a new Missouri valley record had been made in the half mile. The race was run faster than the valley record, but as this meet was with one of the Big Eight and not with a conference team the former record stands.

Although the day was cold and promised rain the turnout at the meet was very good and the footers did their share in helping to win the races.
