BOARD ELECTION MONDAY.

Five Members of Athletic Board to Be Chosen by Student Voters.

The annual Athletic Board election will be held Monday. At this time five out of the nine candidates are to be chosen to control the school's athletics for the coming year.

As in former years, the place of election will be the Armory. The polls, or rather the poll, is to be open from 9:30 to 12:30 and from 1:30 to 4:30. All male students who have made twelve hours credit during the preceding semester are eligible to vote.

Every voter must vote for five and only five of the candidates; any ballot which contains more or less than five names will be discarded. As in former years, faculty members of the present board will act as judges of election.

NEW BUILDING CREATES INTEREST IN LAW COLLEGE

That the College of Law of the University is an important department in the work at Nebraska is evidenced by the recent authorization of a new building on the city campus for the exclusive use of that college. There has been appropriated for this purpose \$85,000, exclusive of the cost of equipment, and this amount will provide a building sixty-three by one hundred thirty-six feet, and three stories in height exclusive of the basement.

This acquisition of a building by the college has caused an increase of interest in the work and equipment of that part of the University. The requirements for admission have been raised so that it is now necessary for the embryo lawyer to have finished one year of work in the Arts and Sciences College before entering upon the real work in the law. The legal work itself covers a course extending over a period of three years, and includes not only the essentials, such as property, contracts, torts, etc., but also the more specialized studies of admiralty, administrative law, irrigation law and many others which are included in elective courses. The student is required to take eight hours of this elective work besides the average of fourteen hours of required work for six semesters. Added to these is the practical application of the rules of law and procedure in the moot courts, of which there are two held each Friday throughout the school year. In these courts all steps in the prosecution of an action either in equity or law are required, the students themselves acting as attorneys, witnesses, parties and jurors, and a professor as judge.

The law students are prominent men about school and have time for the gaining of college honors as is evidenced by the fact that eight of the sixteen men receiving letters in football were law students, that for the last four years the varsity captain has been a "law"; that four out of ten letter men on the basketball squad, several of the baseball squad, one editor, all associate editors, one managing editor, and two business managers of the Daily Nebraskan were of that college, and that the senior, junior and Kosmet Klub plays were managed and the leading parts taken by lawyers; that the College of Law furnished seven out of the thirteen members of the Society of Innocents, and that two of the eight class presidents were law students. Other activities of minor note are supported by the College.

Not only are the "laws" prominent at home, however, Nebraska is one of the recognized schools of the United States, and her professors, present and past, have become distinguished in their profession. Dr. Maxey is a recognized authority on international law, and upon Japanese-American relations, he having written a text on the former subject and several articles upon the latter. He was also a member of the Portland Peace Commission, and counsel in the controversy over admission of Japanese to the San Francisco schools. Professor Conant is a well-known professor of property, and is to teach that subject at the summer session in the University of Michigan.
