

**CHANCELLOR ISSUES WARNING WITH RESPECT TO PARADE**

Repetition of Parade of Three Years Ago Might Prove Disastrous This Year.

With a view to forestalling any undue rowdyism during the shirt-tail parade, which occurs this evening the Chancellor has written the following letter. It is addressed primarily to the cadet officers and to the Innocents, but its suggestions are such as should be borne in mind by all:

To the Officers of the Cadet Battalion and the Members of the Society of Innocents:

After the disgraceful conduct of University students during the "shirt-tail parade" three years ago, in entering places where they were not invited, and particularly in entering the Woman's Building and breaking at least one door into a young woman's private room, the faculty and the people of the state demanded the abolition of a custom under cover of which such disgraceful conduct was allowed to take place. Two years ago, on the very positive assurance that all future parades would be orderly, and that no depredations would be committed, no unauthorized places entered, and no offensive language used, the parade was permitted. On that occasion the pledges of representative students, including officers and Innocents, were carried out to the letter, and the good name of the University suffered in no respect. A year ago there was some lowering of the standard established the year before, though the conduct of the students was very much better than under the old custom.

Addressing you now as a friend and co-worker for the good repute of the University and the state, I am sending this letter to those who, if they really appreciate the gravity of the situation, can control student sentiment.

After the very unwelcome notoriety resulting from the recent encampment, we cannot afford to have anything happen which will cause further criticism, or arouse a public sentiment which will compel me to mete out punishment for misconduct. I am asking each and all of you to use every possible effort to restrain the lawless. If there be any such among us, and to repress the undue effervescence of well-meaning, but misguided enthusiasm.

It has been suggested that if any disorder should follow this competitive drill, it would be desirable to abolish the custom. I mention this not as a threat, but merely to show how faculty members and public look at certain things.

I regret that I shall be away to deliver a high school commencement address during the night of the "compet." I hope that the boys will have a splendid time. I shall be glad to help financially in collecting such fuel for a bonfire on Nebraska field as the merchants of the city may donate.
