The backfield played a good, consistent game, but were unable to make good gains owing to the inability of the line in opening holes for them. Ernie Frank made three touchdowns and kicked one goal, making all of the Varsity scores. All of the touchdowns were made from long runs.

Howard, the star quarter of last year's freshman team, handled the Varsity fairly well, but lacks experience. His punting was of a high class. and is at present running "Jimmy" Gibson a close race for punting honors

The line is now giving the coach more trouble than anything else. The freshmen did not seem to have a great deal of trouble in breaking through, and several times caused the Varsity to punt or use the forward pass to make up ground lost in line plunges.

The freshman team played a strong game on the defense, but was weaker on the offense. In the back field Rutherford was easily the star performer for the freshmen, several times carrying the ball for long gains He is a good tackler and a strong player on the defensive.
