Howard, the star quarter of last year's freshman team, handled the Varsity fairly well, but lacks experi. ence. His punting was of a high class. and is at present running "Jimmy Gibson a close race for punting honors The line is now giving the coach more trouble than anything else. The freshmen did not seem to have a great deal of trouble in breaking through, and several times caused the Varsity to punt or use the forward pass to make up ground lost in line plunges.

The freshman team played a strony game on the defense, but was weaker on the offense. In the back field Rutherford was easily the star performer for the freshmen, several times carrying the ball for long gains He is a good tackler and a strong player on the defenslve.
